

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


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




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Keynote Speakers

My name is Lance McLemore.


I graduated from the University of Alabama in Huntsville with a BA in studio art and philosophy. I like to spend my free time creating different things. I might paint, draw, or sew.

Matt Horan



Matthew Horan is a young autistic man. He is a non-speaker who uses AAC (Augmentative and Alternative Communication). He also has dyspraxia which is a neurodevelopmental disorder of movement and coordination in which messages sent from the brain to the muscles are interrupted.

Matthew started his courier business eight years ago (2014) when he was in Grade 11. Horan Courier Services is a social enterprise that gives Matthew a meaningful job that he loves and helps him to be a contributing member of his community. He has recently expanded his business to include consulting services to AAC users and providers interested in learning more about people who communicate differently.

Matthew took part in a panel sharing his experience of employment at The Autism CRC Autism@Work Virtual Summit in August 2021.

Matthew was a presenter at the AGOSCI 15th Biennial Conference in Hobart, Tasmania in September 2022.

Matthew wants to teach people about all the different ways you can communicate. He wants to be a teacher to people like him who use AAC. He wants to educate people about non speakers.

Dr Andy Smidt



Speech Pathologist, Lecturer and Researcher at Sydney University, Andy brings many years expertise supporting people who have complex communication needs.

During the course of clinical practice some cases provide multiple opportunities to highlight evidence based practice working in the real world.

What do you do when a person does not seem that interested?

This session will focus on their top 10 practical tips, tricks and favourite therapy activities at the moment to encourage those who may be reluctant communicators.

Case study examples will be referred to with consent.

Areas discussed will include:

- linking LAMP to the NSW curriculum for literacy support
- taking out the toys
- sharing the moment with a person
- how to incorporate into everyday routines/activities

Leanna is a Speech Pathologist who is happiest when her clients are able to independently tell her what they want to say. She has over 20 years' experience working with AAC and has spent the last several years running LAMP workshops in Australia and New Zealand.

Speech Pathologist who works exclusively for Schools in NSW.
Betty is on a mission to ensure every child has the best device to suit their needs so they can say what they want when they want.
She brings a practical approach to working collaboratively in an education setting.

been supporting LAMP within the
classroom context.

During this presentation they will share practical tips, tricks and strategies that they have used to grow awareness and implementation of LAMP within the school community to promote participation and communication for and support your child along their AAC journey.

Kimberley Rossouw has been teaching in Schools for Specific Purposes for almost 10 years. Throughout her career she has worked with students from K-12 who present with a range of disabilities. Kimberley has a passion for supporting all students to communicate using AAC and has experience working with a variety of systems.

Betty has been supporting the trial and implementation of LAMP WFL VI in a school for specific purposes in NSW. She will be joined by Kimberley Rossouw (Assistant Principal) who has been involved in the trials.

Together they will share their experience of trialling and modelling on a robust AAC system for students with limited to no vision.

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Sam Brydon



Speech Pathologist and Researcher based in New Zealand. Sam has worked within a special school for the past 10 years supporting children, their carers and teachers to successfully communicate through AAC. Sam has recently begun presenting LAMP training in New Zealand.

Current research shows that parents and families are instrumental in the success of any AAC system for children, but the skills needed to support AAC, including LAMP, are not intuitive.

My recent doctoral research looked at the supports that families need to help their children use AAC, and I have also worked with many families to successfully implement LAMP in the home.

In this workshop I will present a coaching model that I have used, alongside some case studies that illustrate how to implement it successfully.

Participants will learn how to guide families through making an action plan, practising the skills they need, providing feedback and setting new goals to support their child on their LAMP journey.

Speech Pathologist with over 20 years experience supporting AAC in both Private Practice and government services.

Julie is a positive support for all she works with and strongly believes in having fun while learning.

She works creatively to ensure that collaborative goals are achieved in practical ways for a busy lifestyle.

For several years Julie has been supporting a School for Specific Purposes in Sydney to integrate LAMP across their curriculum.

This has included whole school training, individual teacher and student support.

Julie will share some of the success and strategies that they have used in order to access the curriculum and lead to increased communication and participation for students within their school context

Whilst we have had technology being incorporated into our classrooms for some time now, and more and more students have access to iPads and technology at home, everyday individual access to devices can still seem a bit foreign in primary schools.

When a student has a high tech AAC device, they have it with them during both class and playground time. This can be daunting at times as concerns around protecting the device arise as well as preventing other students from using the device. With strategies in place, this can be overcome and the main focus then becomes increasing the device use throughout the day.

This session will focus on sharing some of the resources that have been used to increase our device use in the school community and playground.
